

Some Smart Questions To Ask DJs And Bands

(Compare "Apples To Apples")

- 1. How many years of experience do you have?
 - More experience tends to make better talent. The performer learns from any mistakes or trouble shooting at other clients' events. Three to five years is a good minimum.
- 2. Are you full time or part time?
 - Full timers may be more expensive (to make a living) but are more committed to their service because their success depends on it!
- 3. Are your associates full time or part time? Are associates co-owners of the company or sub contactors? Co-owners care about doing a better job to promote their business.
- 4. Who would be my DJ? You or?
- 5. Do you include subwoofers (for rich bass and better sound) in your fee?
- 6. Do you include lighting for the dance area in your price?
- 7. Do you use "intelligent" lighting (much more sophisticated, expensive to purchase, can control color, dim, movement) or the "plug and play" lights (no control, much cheaper to buy, less sophisticated)?
- 8. When do you arrive to set-up?

Special Questions For Bands:

1. How long ago was your sample cd recorded (recent, couple of years, 5+ years)?

Note: Because DJs use prerecorded music to create an experience from live audience reaction, a sample cd from a DJ is not a very accurate way to gauge how he/she will perform at your event with your favorite music.

- 2. Was the cd recorded in a live setting (similar to how your event would sound) or in a studio?
- 3. Are the vocalists (you may like) still with the band?
 - If you saw the band perform, make sure any musicians you liked will be the ones performing at your event. Some bands substitute players all the time.
- 4. How long are your breaks? How many?
- 5. Does the full band play at cocktails or just a few musicians? The full band may cost more but the cocktail music would be much more interesting and varied.
